Message from Scott...

As I am writing this I can still see the last slithers of white snow picking out the field boundaries of the high ground around Richmond. Last week the world was white whereas my expectation (and hope!) is that the world is vibrant green as you pick up and read this magazine. I suspect the snow drops will have had their moment and the more confident daffodils are now in charge (note to Bishop John: don't eat them!).

Let me go back, however, to the white world that was Narnia. The schools had been closed for three consecutive days and I was cycling through the snow for the first day back. Spied in the snow at Gallowgate was a small blue bag. Normally such things have no value but experience dictates that such small things can have big importance.

The small blue bag contained money. Lots of money. Three hundred and fifty pounds!

Moral maze number one: What would you do? I genuinely think most people would do the right thing and hand it in with the hope that it is collected.

Moral maze number two: Would you hand it in if it was £10? What about £20? Where would you draw your line?

Moral maze number three: The money in the small blue bag was claimed by the rightful owner. On occasions (there have been a few!) it was not and the money is returned to the finder (me!). What do you do then? Do you keep it or give it to charity? What did I do?

For some the answer is obvious and easy: the 'right' thing to do is always to hand the money in and always give to charity if it is not claimed. But

Moral maze number four: Does your own personal wealth make a difference? It mattered to Jesus that the widow's mite was given from poverty. It had a value to it that was greater than a rich man's gift of gold.

So too the loving act of handing in money or giving to charity has a greater relative cost if one has less wealth and, especially, if one is struggling to make ends meet. Many struggle to make ends meet.

There are some who are authors of their own misfortune. There are others, however, who are working hard, sometimes with more than one job, and yet still struggle to be close to 'comfortable and secure.' The continually growing gap between the richest and the rest is deeply concerning and unsettling. Here are some stories from the recent snow to illustrate a growing concern:

In the very worst of the snow when the roads were blocked a worker walked from Catterick Garrison to Richmond (and back) to their closed place of work. If they didn't they would not get paid.

A young bus driver I met in Greenock walked to work in the snow only to be sent home as the roads were closed and no busses were running. He received a phone call at lunchtime asking whether he was taking the day as one of days from his holiday entitlement or, instead, an unpaid day's leave.

The same bus driver had already had a scratch on the bus he was driving. The damage was covered by the insurance but there was an excess to pay and this sum was divided equally so as to come out of his salary over the next sixth months.

It can only get harder for the widow to release her mite in a world that is less generous and more demanding.

The good news, however was in Jesus. It is in Jesus. And, God willing, should be in us. We have a gospel of transformation that recognises injustice, highlights injustice, and works to stop injustice. We face a growing challenge: The proportion of those, in our church, who are retired and out of the workplace has increased. We should strive to stay informed so as to work and pray for those working hard and yet struggling, and for those facing injustice as they work.

Likewise we can pray that we do not normalise the increasing gulf between rich and poor that crosses national borders, and affects both young and old alike. Retirement is certainly no guarantee of wealth.

Many struggle to make ends meet. The bible stories and testimony is so, so often within the context of the struggle of living.

As we see spring erupt we are reminded, again, that God's power is no small thing that nibbles at the edges. As holders of God's good news we pray that we do more than nibble as we work in the world and sometimes challenge the world.

The bell will be far busier than it was in Richmond. There are 2 services every day and 4 on Sunday with 900 families attending church regularly! A suitable tower has yet to be built but that should be no problem compared to the difficulty of getting the bell through customs in Cochin docks!"



"The Happy Bodgers". Over the last few months a few of our gentlemen have been looking at how they can work together to help others who may be in need of a practical assistance. As a result they have formed a group called "The Happy Bodgers". Happily they are far more skilled than their title suggests and they are able to offer a variety of help free of charge.



They write -

"We realise that, as people grow older or disabled, they may need help with odd jobs. They may be perfectly capable of changing a light bulb, but can't safely climb onto a chair to do it. Or climb into the loft to retrieve stored items. So we offer to do such simple tasks on a voluntary basis provided they are within our own abilities. These are DIY jobs which may require simple skills, not the sorts of job that would need a 'white van man'. We have different skill sets and could allocate tasks accordingly.

Try us - we can say no if we don't feel capable. We could probably not take on regular tasks such as lawn mowing, weeding, shopping etc.

Kathmandu 2018

Part 1

We had a wonderful trip to Nepal! After 6 years, it was a great feeling as the plane dropped into the Kathmandu valley amid the old familiar hills.

Unlike previous visits, there were no classes to be given, no talks to prepare. We had accepted an invitation to the (Hindu) wedding of the daughter of some old friends. We were met at the airport and driven (through rush hour traffic jams) to a delightful hotel in the centre of Kathmandu, where we were soon ensconced in a large 'apartment' room. Opposite the huge bed was an unbroken line of wardrobe doors – except that one of the doors opened unexpectedly into the bathroom. "Through the Wardrobe", Nepali style.

The following day, guests gathered from all corners of the earth; USA, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and Japan. The bride, Rose, works as a doctor in the USA, where she trained and has lots of friends. Her bridegroom, Nischal, is a businessman in Nepal, but would return with her to the USA for a while. We gathered on a large balcony, where industrious ladies were elegantly drawing swirling henna patterns on the arms of lady guests. Doubtless some religious significance, but largely a matter of fashion, I suspect!

In a Christian wedding, the guests pay attention to the service for an hour or less and then repair to a party. The Hindu equivalent takes up to a week, with various rituals taking place at 'auspicious' times. The guests party before, during and after these events, perhaps paying some attention to what is going on, but mainly eating, drinking and chatting among themselves or on mobile phones.

We can't really explain all the rituals, especially as the bride and groom were from different castes with different customs, which all had to be observed. They involved two priests ('pandits') and decorated areas like altars with fruit and vegetables, rice, water pots, incense sticks, a sacred fire, traditional leaf plates and other symbols. With all the brightly coloured saris, the visual impact was dazzlingly colourful.

The couple did several perambulations at different times, pouring out water and scattering rice grains. On one occasion, the bride was carried, not by the groom but by her brother!

Tika (the red spot on the forehead) was given to any guests who wanted it, together with a small defined sum of rupees in new notes.

As Christians, we were not made to feel out of place, even though we opted, as always, not to receive the tika, which is the sign of a Hindu god.

During a lull, the bride's father took us to a hill resort for some fresh air (a respiratory break from the crowded, dusty, smoggy capital.) We had time for a short walk up a hill, which we frequently used to climb with our kids and dog, and enjoyed the views.

Thus we spent nearly a week living in luxury with transport provided at the expense of the bride's parents, our good friends Buddha and Geeta Basnyat. The very first ceremony, the *Swoyabhar*, took place in a very large central hotel and there were over 500 guests. Among them were so many old friends, Christian and otherwise, that we had to rush to get our buffet meal before our transport left.

After this time of luxury, we moved to a small Christian Guest House in Patan, the other side of the Bagmati River. From there, we were able to visit old haunts and meet with a lot of old friends.

Christian Aid Week 13 - 19 May 2018

Every May for more than 60 years, thousands of churches across Britain and Ireland have collected so that Christian Aid can carry on its work with local partners and communities to fight injustice, respond to humanitarian emergencies, campaign for change and help the world's most



vulnerable people claim the services and rights we take for granted.

What does Christian Aid do?

Among other things Christian Aid *supports health work in 10 countries*: e.g. in Africa more than 5 million people have been helped through health education to access essential HIV, malaria, maternal and child health and family planning services.

Almost 1/3 of their total income since 1945 has been spent on humanitarian emergencies and disasters world wide.

In 2016/17 they responded to 44 emergencies in 26 countries to help 1.2 million people e.g. violence in **Nigeria**; the earthquake in **Nepal**; the **Rohyngya** crisis; the **Syria** crisis; the **Sierra Leone** mudslide.

40 million people globally are internally displaced - they have had to flee their homes, uprooted by natural disasters or conflict but have remained in their own countries. They don't have the media coverage given to refugees but their struggle is just as hard and Christian Aid continues to support them.

This year Christian Aid Week focuses on supporting displaced people in Haiti and elsewhere. Their response to the Oxfam scandal: "We must not let the actions of a few individuals stop us from providing vital support and help to those most in need, including in Haiti. We must continue to stand by vulnerable people who are struggling to live through disasters and their aftermath"
