# <u>Rev Martin's Message</u>

# Feb 2018

Dear friends,

Travelling well

It was on my 7th birthday that the Fletcher family moved from Kirby Hill to the south. Wherever we lived thereafter, we would refer to the nearest town as 'Richmond'! And ever since that move I have always felt that a part of me remained here in North Yorkshire. So I am delighted to be returning: delighted and thankful. My 7 year old

self would never even have dreamt that one day I would return as Rector of the United Benefice of Richmond with Hudswell and Downholme and Marske.

I write this at Epiphany, when we think about journeys. In '*coming home*' I have not quite *"walked round the world"* as Bishop Helen-Ann seems to have done, but I do feel that I have been on quite a journey.

On leaving school I studied Mechanical Engineering at Bradford University, and my subsequent engineering career included spells with Leyland Trucks, Rolls-Royce, Ford, and Nissan. It was not until I reached my late 30s that I felt 'ready' to respond to the sense of vocation to ordained ministry that had been with me for some time.

I trained at Ripon College Cuddesdon and then served my curacy in the Diocese of Guildford. My first incumbency was in Tiptree, near Colchester in Essex, and for the last seven years I have been Vicar of Hersham in Surrey – 10 miles from the *'other'* Richmond.



Evidently, the Benefice has been on a journey, too. Reaching out to the wider community in new and imaginative ways, joining forces to become a United Benefice comprising four distinct communities, growing in confidence as Christian disciples and in *Loving, Living, Learning*, and cycling from Richmond to Richmond are just a few examples. The Local

Development Plan is going to have an enormous impact on the communities of Richmondshire, meaning that as the Benefice journeys into the future we will be in for an interesting ride.

Crucially, the Development Plan is giving us a wonderful opportunity for mission – for the local church to be at the very heart of nothing less than building the kingdom of God in these parts. Our task is to be a 'presence' in that process – and in line with the overall theme of the Epiphany season to reveal the glory of God.

As a keen cyclist I am pleased to see that plans are already afoot for the local church to be a 'presence' when the Tour de Yorkshire spotlight falls on Richmond in May (when we will be in Eastertide). After the example of Wakefield Cathedral in 2015, '*Allez-luia*' I say!



To travel well we need always to be open to God's guidance and God's grace. We can only do that if we make time and space for him in prayer and study of his Word. I know that you are diligent in both, and I am grateful to you for your prayers for me as I prepare to join you. Be assured of my prayers for you.

With every blessing for your journey through Lent – and, from Eastertide, for our new life of journeying together...

# <u>Letter from Rev Jennifer</u>

Reflections from Downholme and Marske.

Why not just close the tiny churches with tiny congregations? A question often asked and which may be asked more often in the future. But in their defence I think they provide sacred spaces for people where they can think and reflect. Places where prayer can be offered and solace can be found, places where in the silence God may be heard. We may struggle to keep them going but that doesn't mean we shouldn't try.

Many of our visitors write in the Visitors' books in the churches:

#### "Thank you for keeping your church open for me"

That summarises many of the entries over the past few years. Others include:

A peaceful stop before the New Year; peaceful and lovely; beautiful, special, peaceful; may all lives be filled with stillness, simplicity and contentment; may the Peace be with us all every step of the way; lovely to spend a minute or two in a building that has heard centuries of prayer. Thanks.

Occasionally an entry indicates that someone troubled has found great solace from time spent in the empty church. That above all else seems to me to be a reason for keeping our buildings open all the time throughout the year and we hold our visitors, sad or glad, in our prayers as we hope they pray for us.

St Edmund's Parish Church in Marske sits directly on the section of Coast to Coast route from Reeth to Richmond and many of the walkers call in to the church. Some we meet and talk with during the week if we are cleaning or flower arranging or attending to the other details that keep the church going, a very few we meet on a Sunday before or after the service though very seldom joining us for worship. But we wondered if there was any way we could find to engage with the invisible ones, the passers -by we never get to meet.

Two years ago we deliberately thought about how we could serve our "pilgrims" who pass through and the suggestion was made that we create a refreshment bar. Having no running water, we had to keep things simple: bottled water, cartons of fruit juice, crisps and biscuits of various kinds. We ask for donations into the wall safe on an honesty basis which has covered the costs and helped to raise funds to keep the building in good repair. The one request we often have is for the use of our toilet but unfortunately, since we have no running water, we don't have one of those, either for our own use or for the use of visitors.

Simple or not, the refreshments have been very warmly received. The comments following the introduction of the refreshment bar now often include thanks for our hospitality. For example: Beautiful church and great flapjack!

We were however greatly encouraged to receive a letter in early November from Buxtehude in Germany.

#### The letter read:

Last April we, that are my husband, me and two friends, walked the Coast-to Coast-Walk. Henry, my husband explored in advance all possibilities for buying food. So we came to Marske (the middle of our day route) and knew that there was no place for a break or a shop. We liked a break, so Henry suggested "Have a look around. Maybe there is a new shop or pub, which was not yet mentioned in our booklet." And we found the poster with the offer to have snacks in the church.

Our friends said, strange – in a church – we don't need a break. It was a bit strange for me too, but I wanted the break, especially the snacks! So our friend gave in to it and

we went to the church. It was Easter and there were people just leaving the building. Our friends said, we can't go in there – look there is an Easter service or something. So we hesitated, but you had already seen us and invited us in. We were shown where we could sit und you offered us coffee which was very much appreciated! And then we had such a nice conversation! This really was church one can wish for.

What a warm-hearted and friendly welcome! I just thought if we had someone like you at home, I would go to church more often. It doesn't need concerts or comedy performances to attract people to church. It's less uncomplicated what you do- you live what you communicate. That makes a church a home.

The C2C walk was a very important experience for us with many good things to learn and to remember. And when I think back I often think of this unexpected encounter. So you made that day to a special one and this letter is saying Thank You!

Marske is a tiny village and the congregation is small but we didn't need to be big or rich to offer hospitality, human company and an open door.

I wrote back to Anka thanking her for her letter and ended with this:

I was glad you found warmth and welcome in our church. It is what we would hope people find though of course we don't all of us manage to offer it all the time. We all have bad days!

At the heart of my faith is the belief that God is a God of love and that we are called to share God's love where ever and whenever we can. And so we send to all of you our love from Marske. We were really blessed in meeting you. Keep us and our future in your prayers as we keep you in ours.



#### Lent Talks – Preparing for Easter with Radio 4



#### 2018 Lent Course

In the season of Lent many Christians choose to join a Lent Study Group as part of their preparations for Easter. For many years The York Course has been used to support and guide this work.

This year's course follows the pattern of previous years: 5 sessions spread over 5 weeks; contributions from various well known Christian leaders via an audio CD; and additional texts and questions available via a course booklet.

The main writer for this year's course is Bishop John Pritchard. He is the retired Bishop of Oxford who now lives

in Richmond. He will be leading a launch event at 19:00 on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> February at St Marys Church.

Ash Wednesday, the start of Lent, is on 14<sup>th</sup> February and there are services taking place at different churches throughout the town. The first session of the York Course takes place in the week beginning 19<sup>th</sup> February. The fifth and final session takes place in the week beginning 19<sup>th</sup> March and Palm Sunday is on 25<sup>th</sup> March.

There are presently three groups running:




