

<u>Martin's Message</u>

November 2018

Our new Vision

Bishop Nick writes, "Without a vision the people perish." So says Old Testament wisdom. But without a strategy the vision can quickly become a mere dream. Strategy isn't magic; it is the 'plumbing' that gets us from here to where the vision says we need to reach. Ultimately, any strategy has to align as closely as possible to our discernment of God's plan. It needs to be continuously underpinned by prayer."

On Saturday 3rd November the Richmond with Hudswell PCC will be gathering for an Away Day, to consider where we as a church community need to be in a few years' time. Realising our new parish vision will require a strategic approach: an action plan. This will involve setting out a number of goals, each of which will require us, together as a church community, to meet a series of specific, measurable objectives. These will in turn involve the introduction of small initiatives, or steps along the way.

Our new parish vision must complement our diocesan vision: **Confident Christians, Growing churches, Transforming Communities'** characterised by the values of **Loving, Living, Learning**). The diocesan strategy to realise this vision involves achieving five goals, within a timescale of five years:

- thriving as a distinctive diocese
- re-imagining ministry
- nurturing lay discipleship
- building leadership pipelines
- growing young people as Christians.

For each of these goals various carefully defined objectives have been set. For example, an objective for goal 1 is that 'All parishes are to have plans in place that are aligned with diocesan strategy, vision, values and culture, and can report on these plans by 2020'. For goal 5 an objective is that '75% of churches are to have an active working community of children and young adults'.

Our diocesan vision has been evolving since the formation of the Diocese of Leeds in 2014, and the strategy to realise it is due to be launched next year. Developing our parish vision and its associated action plan will also take time. It began back in June when I mentioned in this column the need for a Vision Day, asking that we should all be thinking and praying about what our vision should be. In line with Bishop Nick's comment above, please continue to ensure that this process is underpinned by prayer.

We can be assured that the diocesan vision is a framework, not a blueprint. We do not need to address every goal but concentrate on the weaknesses, opportunities and threats we face in our particular context — whilst also celebrating our strengths! As we go forward our parish vision will be truly life-giving if it is aligned as closely as possible with that of the diocese and, at least as importantly, with what we discern to be God's plan and purposes for us.

RIBBON OF REMEMBRANCE FOR FIRST WORLD WAR CENTENARY-

An ambitious project to literally link Catterick Garrison to Richmond with a 'Ribbon of Remembrance' is nearing completion.



Over the past few months The Green Howards

Museum team have been asking local people to submit profiles of those who lived through the events of 1914 to 1918.

This ever-growing catalogue of almost 150 portraits and biographies is already available to view on the museum's website – greenhowards.org.uk

Now, these personal profiles are being transformed into a physical display along the three mile route between Richmond and Catterick Garrison, which itself was created by Prisoners of War in 1917.

People are being encouraged to walk the ribbon route during the weekend of the 10th and 11th of November as part of their Remembrance commemorations.

The Ribbon of Remembrance project has been made possible with support from The Armed Forces Covenant Community Fund.

RIBBON OF REMEMBRANCE EVENTS

Walk the ribbon route: from Catterick Garrison with the museum team. The walks start at the entrance to Help for Heroes Phoenix House. The Sunday morning walk will arrive in Richmond for the traditional commemoration in Friary Gardens. Saturday 10 November at 10.30am and 1.30pm; Sunday 11 November at 9.15am and 2pm

Remembrance Sunday soup fundraiser: Sunday 11 November 11am to 3pm. In partnership with local independent greengrocer, Neeps and Tatties, we will be providing a tasty soup lunch in the museum's stunning Normanby Room. Proceeds will benefit the Richmond Branch of the Royal British Legion and the museum's Medal Room improvement project. £5 - booking essential.

Ribbon of Remembrance display: up to Friday 30 November. Free display in the museum entrance area. This will feature the work of The Embroiderer's Guild and marking the centenary anniversary of the end of the First World War.

Fairly Traded Christmas Shopping - The Fair Trade stall will be in church as usual on the last Sunday of each month but in addition there will be a big Christmas

Celtic Advent – 40 days of devotions to Christmas By David Cole, BRF, £8.99

This beautiful book is clear. It begins with the concept of Advent and ends with the celebration of Christmas. In between it spends three 10 day periods exploring Christ's first coming,

His present coming into our lives and his future coming.

The Language of Tears – Their gift, mystery and meaning By David Runcorn, Canterbury Press, £12.99

Tears are a common experience we rarely discuss, and then only in relation to pain and loss. David Runcorn draws upon a long Christian tradition of seeing tears as a gift to explore their deeper meaning and purpose, their place in human life and their significance for prayer and spirituality.

In the early centuries of the church tears were regarded as an extension of baptism or a gift of the Spirit. They were integral to prayer and a vital part of human integration and maturing. Jesus said that those who mourn were 'blessed'. The Language of Tears explores how tears are a natural and important way of processing loss, uncertainty and anxiety, drawing upon theology, scripture, psychology and biology.
