Letter from Bishop John

October often seems to me like a nothing month. I shouldn't really be rude to it. After all it's the month of the victory at Trafalgar (1805), the month the House of Commons burnt down (1834), Jane Eyre was published (1847), and both The King and I (1953) and the Post office Tower (1965) opened in London. Oh, and the Watergate trial started in 1974.

But October seems to be the month when summer has well and truly gone, autumn hasn't really got under way, and Christmas is still far off. I wish October well but I can't really get excited about it. It's actually pretty ordinary.

But here I come up short. What do I mean by 'ordinary'? In God's world nothing is ordinary in the sense of bland, boring and with nothing to say for itself. It's just that we haven't looked deeply enough. The American writer Barbara Brown Taylor says that the most ordinary things are drenched in divine possibility.

That's particularly true of people. I realised long ago that there are no such things as 'ordinary people.' When you met anybody new you're meeting a huge bundle of stories, some wonderful, some tragic, some challenging, all fascinating. Ask anybody to tell you a little about themselves and you get a feast of stories because every life is deep in experience and rich in detail.

When people say of themselves that they're 'just' this or that, or when they say they're 'just ordinary', everything in me rises up in protest. There are two words often used in conversation for which I would like to be able to issue on the spot fines. One is 'just', and the other is 'fine'. ('How are you?' 'Fine'. Which covers everything from 'this has been the most memorable week of my life' to 'I'm just about hanging on, but don't push me.')

In the Church's year October is called 'ordinary time', which simply means it's not Lent, Advent, Christmas, Easter etc. To my mind that allows us to concentrate on redeeming anything that might be called ordinary and bringing it to a greater beauty and purpose. Lets do 'ordinary' things with 'extraordinary' love, whether it's having coffee with a friend, sending an email, going to church, tidying up the garden, helping a neighbour – or being kind to ourselves for a bit.

I slipped 'going to church' in there. If we're churchgoers the Sunday morning experience can easily become a bit ordinary, like any repeated habit. But if we come looking for the extraordinary, the touch of grace, the word of the Lord, the splash of beauty, the conviction of truth, then Sunday morning can become quite an adventure. It all depends on our expectation. Try it.

So, here's to an extraordinary October. (And by the way, in October the News of the World was first published in 1843, St Pancras Station opened in 1868, and the People's Republic of China was formed in 1949. But you probably knew all that anyway...)

Or climb into the loft to retrieve stored items. So we offer to do such simple tasks on a voluntary basis provided they are within our own abilities. These are DIY jobs which may require simple skills, not the sorts of job that would need a 'white van man'. We have different skill sets and could allocate tasks accordingly.


CONGRATULATIONS to our Bell Tower Team...
