

Loving, Living, Learning

The Richmond with Hudswell PCC is made up of people who represent the wider church community in the governance of our church. It is their responsibility to ensure your voice is heard when decisions affecting us all are taken.

My first meeting of the Richmond with Hudswell PCC is scheduled for Tuesday 5th June. At the time of writing, the agenda for that meeting has not yet been set – but one item I would like to include is holding a Parish Vision Day later in the summer.

When the PCC gather for that Vision Day they will consider where we as a church community wish to be in a few years' time. In a process of strategic planning such as this it is often helpful to agree statement' (indicating what kind of church we want to be), and a 'mission statement' (illustrating how we will get there). Then, in order to make progress in realising our vision, various priorities will need to be set: specific aims which we will all support and in which we can all be involved. Target timing and budgets for each of these aims will ensure we move in the right direction and at a sustainable pace.

I am mentioning this now because I would ask you to think and pray about what our vision should be and what actions we should be prioritising. Please speak to any member of the PCC about this so that your thinking can be reflected in the Vision Day discussions.

As a starting point, you may wish to look again at the excellent Brochure prepared during the recent Vacancy. Is its description of our parish fully reflective of who we are? Of the challenges it mentions, which ones should we be putting first?

A good example of vision and mission statements comes from our own Diocese. The vision statement "Enabling confident Christians to live and tell the good news of Jesus Christ in our region" and its simplified version "Confident Christians – Growing Churches – Transforming Communities", indicate what we in the Diocese of Leeds wish to be and to do. Loving, Living, Learning captures how we as Christians are seeking to realise that vision.

On 20th May we celebrated Pentecost, the 'birthday of the Church', when the promised gift of the Holy Spirit was given to the first apostles. By that same Spirit we can seek God's guidance and receive his strength as we strive to serve the wider community in which we are set and into which we are being sent.

Bishop Nick has written of his hope to see: 'a vibrant diocese (vibrating in the tension between the wind of the Spirit and the wind of the world)'.

He has also pointed out that if the world with whom we wish to engage is to catch a glimpse of what we offer – good news – then in word and deed our mission must be meaningful to those around us.

Our Parish Brochure prepared the ground for us to catch a new vision. Together, let us deliver on this promise – keeping in mind the promise of Jesus to us: 'Remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age'.



Kathmandu 2018. Part 3; Friends and colleagues

Part 1 was about the Hindu wedding of out friends' daughter, which we were invited to attend. Part 2 was about the opportunities to worship in two churches that had grown out of all recognition since we first knew them. The rest of the time was less structured and consisted of meals and meetings with old friends and folk that we used to work with.

We stayed at Goshen House, a Christian guest house run by Jasmine Jirel who was responsible for the guest house at Tansen Hospital for many years. Her husband, Olak, is a surgeon who worked at the hospital. They moved to Kathmandu, I think for their children's' education, and he then worked with our mission, United Mission to Nepal, to help manage the health services and especially the hospitals. He also works at the Anandaban Hospital, just outside the Kathmandu valley, which started as a leprosy hospital, but now takes all sorts of patients. They invited us to their home one evening and we had a delightful talk about old times and new developments. Olak filled me in on the UMN hospitals – I also was involved in managing the hospitals in 2003-5.

Staying with the medical side for the moment, an almost miraculous event occurred. I had been involved in setting up the first medical school in the country, which opened in 1978, and taught physiology there for a few years. For the very first time, and without knowing that I was in the country, the current students organised a re-union for the early batches and their teachers. So I got to meet up with many former colleagues and students (and to give them a brief talk) on an occasion bristling with memories. I drew their attention to the way that those early students, taught under exceptionally primitive conditions and interrupted by many strikes and much political unrest, had gone on to make important contributions to medical care in the country. One had taken up an interest in medical education himself and founded two highly successful medical schools. (At his invitation, I had taught in both.) Another became a foremost plastic surgeon; not doing 'cosmetic' work, but repairing cleft lips and other devastating deformities in a mobile surgical clinic in remote areas. Another became a professor of anatomy... and so on.

Other folk we met; an American physician (who was not even a Christian until after he joined the mission!) and his Irish wife and interesting teenage sons. He is now working in Patan Hospital, where I was once Medical Director, and is a renowned clinical teacher. I attended one of his ward rounds, which also brought back a lot of memories. Then a former house physician who is now a leading cancer specialist. Then Rachel Karrach, who is Medical Director at Tansen and whose 93 year old father was visiting.

I spent another day at Patan Hospital, this time with the current Medical Director. His was an interesting story. He had begun at Patan Hospital as a Health Assistant and our daughter, Mary, formed a friendship with him when she was attached to him on a medical elective nearly 30 years ago. They still keep in touch and the families met in Nepal in 2015. He went on to become a dentist, again in Patan Hospital, and was later appointed Medical Director. He entertained me in his office and then collected together eight or nine staff with whom I had worked in the 1970s and 80s.

We called on another American, a former dietitian who now has Nepal residence status at age 80. She was also full of news and stories. Then there was a lunch with a retired Nepali worker and his wife and charming daughter who had stayed with us during her public health course in Liverpool.

I haven't mentioned everybody, notably the very hospitable church members that we had known even back in 1969. We talked a lot of Nepali, ate a lot of rice and dal and quite a lot of momos and it felt a lot like old times (even the episode of diarrhoea and vomiting!) John and Angela Dickinson

The First Organist at St Mary's

Richmond Church has a good record of raising large sums of money for its projects, viz. the recent new bells. Not so long ago we restored the present organ, and I was reminded of this when I recently came across a document concerning the installation of the first organ in 1809, which was placed in a gallery below the tower.

The document is from the 'Gentlemen of the Organ Committee' to the Mayor, Aldermen and Common council of the Borough of Richmond, and it sets out how they have, with the support of the Corporation and many individuals, raised "a Sum adequate to the Purchase and Erection of an Organ answerable to the best expectations of the Inhabitants."

It goes on, "Thus countenanced, & successful in accomplishing their first great object, the Committee are encouraged to entertain a strong hope, grounded also on the general wishes of the Inhabitants, that the Gentlemen of the Corporation may be induced to extend their indulgence still further...... to assign a suitable Sum for the Stipend of an Organist.......[as] they are decidedly of opinion that an able & experienced Organist is absolutely necessary."

They had someone in mind - a Mr Smith - "who is ready to undertake the duties of an Organist, & to instruct the young singers for £30 pr Ann: - A Sum, in the judgment of the Committee, fair & reasonable."

The document was written by Rev. Christopher Goodwill (1753-1822), the much revered and long-serving rector (1789-1822), whose monument facing the North door is hard to find in the church. The next signature is James Tate, the great scholar who was Master of Richmond Grammar School. The names of other Richmond worthies which follow include Tristram Hogg, whose name as Mayor is carved on Richmond Bridge, the Richmond historian Christopher Clarkson, the Town Clerk John Robinson and another lawyer, Octavus Leefe. A further list of names supporting the Committee's approach include racehorse trainer William Peirse, Thomas Bradley the surveyor of the Richmond-Reeth Turnpike Road, publicans Matthew Whitelock and Thomas Lambert, and a few ladies, including Grathema and Martha Blegborough, who are among members of that family commemorated in the Baptistery Window, and Alice Morgetroy and Eliza Robinson.

Among hundreds of visitors to the exhibition, Peter Harker, a Richmond resident, was interested in finding out more about William Harker, an ancestor and lead miner who married Mary Spedding in St Mary's Parish Church on 21st December 1766. The Harker family were from Upper Birkdale. Peter Harker will be given information about his ancestors in due course.

Two visitors from South Africa, in Richmond for the weekend, came looking for the grave of their grandfather, Mr Pybus, whose chemist's shop was in Richmond about a century ago. They had no other details about him except that he died in the 1920s. St Mary's churchyard was closed in the late 1800s except for those with family graves so Mr Pybus would have been buried in the Reeth Road cemetery. The visitors were given details of the cemetery keeper and chapel and how to get there. If further information is found they will receive it at a later date. S H


